



INFLAMMATORY SKIN DISEASES (OTHER THAN ATOPIC DERMATITIS & PSORIASIS)

CASE REPORT ONE CASE OF PYODERMA GANGRENOSUM WITH ULCERATIVE COLITIS AND HEPATITIS B VIRUS

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Medical history: The patient, male, 43 years old, was admitted to our hospital, with the main etiology of "recurrent abdominal pain and bloody purulent stool for 9 years and ulceration and pain in abdominal and left calf for 7 months". 9 years ago, the patient was suffering from abdominal pain and intermittent bloody purulent stool, he had been treated with antibiotics in the Gastroenterology Department and General Surgery Department. However, since antibiotics treatment had no good efficacy, He was presented at the General Surgery Department of the PUMCH 5 years ago, where he was diagnosed as "ulcerative colitis" and underwent total colostomy and postoperative fistula; also he was advised to have the anastomosis of ileostomy and colonic incision. But 9 months ago, there were ulceration and blood blisters in the fistula, accompanied by considerable pain, followed by ulceration and pyorrhea on the lateral lower leg. Therefore, the patient was treated in the Department of Dermatology of the PUMCH and was diagnosed as "pyoderma gangrenosum(PG)" by skin biopsy and routine examination of hematuria and stool.
