



SKIN CANCER (OTHER THAN MELANOMA)

SYRINGOCYSTADENOMA PAPILLIFERUM - CASE REPORT

Background: Syringocystadenoma papilliferum (SCAP) is a rare, benign adnexal neoplasm with varied presentations that arises from the apocrine glands.

Observation: A 25 -year-old female presented with few years history of a scalp nodule and a last 3 months change in its character, and a sanguinous discharge. Examination revealed a 3.5cm $\times 1.5$ cm fragile nodule on the scalp , actively weeping blood. Clinically the lesions were characterised by exophytic papillary structures, dermoscopically some polymorphous vessels were present. No regional lymph nodes were noticeably palpable. Incision biopsy was performed. Histopathologically, the lesion was reported to be SCAP. On follow-up, the patient remained asymptomatic.
